Learning Disabilities Mortality Review (LeDeR)	<p>Continue to fund the Learning Disabilities Mortality Review Programme (LeDeR), the first national programme aiming to make improvements to the lives of people with a learning disabilities.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>must have a robust plan to ensure that reviews are allocated within 3 months and completed within 6 months of the notification of death to the local area.</li> <li>ensure that local governance for LeDeR is sufficiently robust to demonstrate that action is being taken from local review findings to improve services, reduce health inequalities and address premature mortality</li> <li>ensure that the issues found in local reviews are raised with senior ICS leaders, including with local authority partners, to support joined-up actions to improve services, reduce health</li> </ul>	£31,784	£30,277	£15,892
